Message from your Minister

Story

Dear Ones.

I cannot stop thinking about Bishop Mariann Budde and her inaugural sermon at Washington National Cathedral in January. As you've likely heard by now, at the end of the sermon, she pleaded directly with America's new president. She pleaded for mercy for those who are frightened by the harms he and his administration have promised, specifically naming the fear among LGBTQ children and immigrant communities. Her direct plea was a simple and heartfelt call to compassion. Coming from an Episcopal Bishop, it seems so very clear how her words were so deeply grounded in her Jesus-following tradition. Which makes the backlash she has received from critics who also proudly claim the banner of Christianity feel so baffling.

It has me reflecting once again on the vitally important role of religious communities in the context of states and empires – a role that can often get lost within conversations around the separation of church and state or within societal rules that deem politics as impolite conversation. I'm so grateful for the words of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr on this matter, in this excerpt from his sermon "A Knock at Midnight." If you have a chance, I encourage you to read or listen to the sermon in its entirety – so much of his work still speaks to our context today.

The church must be reminded once again that it is not to be the master or the servant of the state, but the conscience of the state. It must be the guide and the critic of the state,—never its tool. As long as the church is a tool of the state it will be unable to provide even a modicum of bread for men at midnight. If the church does not recapture its prophetic zeal and cease to be an echo of the status-quo it will be relegated to an irrelevant social club with no moral or spiritual authority. If the church does not participate actively in the struggle for peace, economic and racial justice, it will forfeit the loyalty of millions and cause men everywhere to know that it is an institution whose will is atrophied. But if the church will free itself from the shackles of a deadening status-quo, and, recovering its great historic mission, will proceed to speak and act fearlessly and insistently on the questions of justice and peace, it will enkindle the imagination of mankind. It will fire the souls of men and imbue them with a glowing and ardent love for truth, justice and peace.

Beloveds, as we navigate this anxious and unsettling time in our country, may we as a congregation hold close these words of Dr. King. May we as Unitarian Universalists embrace that role of "conscience of the state" with a bold and fierce love. May we prioritize care for each other and ourselves amid the never-ending news feeds that can so easily paralyze us with exhaustion and burnout and overwhelm. May we ground ourselves in community and connectedness, wrapping the most vulnerable among us in protection. May we nourish our souls as we listen for what concrete actions love calls us to during this time. May we remember that we are not alone in this. You are not alone.

May it be so.

Why Donate and Participate?

The Service Auction is our biggest Fundraiser event of the year. It's a wonderful way to make new friends and strengthen current relationships. You can expect a great potluck dinner, and fun activities for the whole family including kids! PLEASE, if you have attended the auction in the past, spread the word and help new people understand how it works. Not only will this be fun; it's also a critical fundraiser for our congregation. Watch for further details coming soon via SWUUlist and other channels.

How it Works

SWUU raises money while providing social opportunities. Members and friends decide on an event they would like to organize and host, or a service they can provide. These events include hikes, dinners, game nights, backyard BBQs, concerts or singalongs at your home or at church, computer service, movie nights, airport deliveries, cleaning, baked goods, repairs, haircuts, teaching a skill, artwork or framed photos created by the donor. At the auction, people sign up for or bid on these services/items. All money raised goes to the church. No cash changes hands at the auction itself. Once the auction is over, you receive an invoice for your purchases.


