

Focus Collection for March: Planned Parenthood of Greater Ohio

SWUU has a long history of supporting Planned Parenthood of Greater Ohio, whose mission is to "deliver innovative health care, education, and advocacy no matter what." They provide essential reproductive health care services to generations of Ohioans. Their services are designed to help people make informed choices that focus on responsibility, prevention of unintended pregnancies, sexually transmitted infections, and reproductive cancers.

Reproductive rights are protected in Ohio! Passing of Issue 1 confirmed that the majority of Ohioans support abortion access. PPGO has 13 health centers and two surgery centers throughout North, East, and Central Ohio, plus a community pharmacy and Virtual Health Center. In these politically charged times, Planned Parenthood steadfastly remains at the forefront of lifelong sexuality education and health care. Donations can be made by check (write PPGO on memo line) and put in the offering basket all month or mailed to the church. You may also use the Vanco Give Plus app. Thank you for your generosity.

NATIONAL ECONOMIC BLACKOUT DAY

The National Economic Blackout, scheduled for February 28, 2025, is a powerful call to action aimed at protesting recent rollbacks of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) policies by major corporations. The primary goal is to demonstrate the significant economic influence of marginalized communities by abstaining from all non-essential spending for 24 hours, beginning at 12 a.m.

What is being asked of you?

- Do not spend money: Refrain from making any purchases, both in-store and online, on February 28.
- Support local businesses: If you must make essential purchases, prioritize small, local, and minority-owned businesses.
- Spread the word: Encourage friends, family, and your community to participate and raise awareness about the blackout.

Origins and Supporters

The initiative was launched by the People's Union in response to corporations scaling back DEI programs. The League of Women Voters is promoting this through social media.

Why Your Participation Matters

Collective economic actions have historically been effective in prompting change. By uniting in this blackout, we send a clear message to corporations about the importance of DEI initiatives and the economic power of marginalized communities. This single day of economic action may be followed by a 3 day economic event or even actions against certain companies..

Our position as SWUU members is to promote diversity, equity and inclusion. Inclusion was the focus of our church service both by Carolyn Stevens' story and by the reflection and activity by SaraJane Wilson and Deb Celinski on February 23. Let's take action and follow their lead.

Safety at SWUU

In light of the current political landscape and recent executive orders targeting immigrants, the LGBTQ+ community, and organizations that promote diversity, equity, and inclusion, as well as concerns from congregants, the SWUU Board has been discussing safety and wanted to share the following information and opportunity:

Feeling nervous about what to do if ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) shows up at church?

At this time, we do not believe there is much of a risk of ICE showing up at SWUU, but wanted to share the below information to empower you all. If ICE does show up, get or call Rev. Ali (or the minister on-call while she is on leave) and/or a Board member immediately. We cannot prevent ICE from entering our building. However, they are only allowed in <u>private</u> portions of the building if they have a warrant <u>signed by a judge</u>. Furthermore, we recommend that you do not talk to them. We are putting up "private area" signs in the back office, which they are not allowed to access. Feel free to check out <u>this great resource from the UUA</u> for more information.

Interested in discussing church safety?

The SWUU Board will be hosting an informal **Safety Town Hall** after church (~noon) next **Sunday, March 2**. We will have some training materials prepared from the UUA to watch together, then open up for dialogue regarding what safety concerns are on people's minds, and how we can move forward feeling more resilient during uncertain times. Pull up a chair to learn together, share ideas, and alleviate some of our worries.

SWUUC is Renewing its Commitment as a Welcoming Congregation

As a congregation, SWUU became a Welcoming Congregation in 1997. It was a long, reflective process of about three years, that included a super majority vote to pass. We were and are so proud of our commitment to being a Welcoming Congregation which means that all sexual orientations and gender identities are welcome at SWUU.

A few years ago, the UUA nudged congregations to renew their Welcoming Congregation commitment. The goal was and is this: "to honor your original pledge, it's essential that new people in the congregation (as well as people who were originally involved in the program) understand your congregation's commitment to this work and learn about the current needs and concerns of LGBTQ+ people." As such, the UUA laid out The Five Practices of Welcome Renewal.

- 1. Becoming a Welcoming Congregation
- 2. Welcoming Worship Services
- 3. Welcoming Days of Observance
- 4. Welcoming Religious Education
- 5. Supporting a Welcoming Project

It is clear that we are well on our way to this renewal of our commitment. There are several links to various options for each of these practices. 
